Court hands Petrakis seven years in jail for sinking

A GREEK court has sentenced shipowner Andreas Petrakis of Iolcos Hellenic to seven years in prison over the sinking of the 132,600-dwt capesize bulker Iolcos Victory

(built 1980) six years ago.
Petrakis was sentenced in
absentia but will be free pending appeal of the sentence,
which was handed down by a
three-member Athens court.

The Icicos Victory was 16 years old when it sank on 14. September 1996 with the loss of four lives, including the Greek master.

Petrakis was charged with manslaughter, causing a ship-wreck and causing injuries. Two Greek engineers that survived the sinking were acquitted.

The Iolcos Victory sank about 100 miles off the South African coast while it was on a laden voyage from Tubarao, Brazil, to China. Five of the 21 crew The court was told that a crack in the NK-classed vessel had been "patched" with cement.

Piraeus lawyer George Trantalides, a specialist in representing the interests of crew and families in such accidents, says the defence's assertion that the sinking was caused by force eight winds tumbled like a stack of cards.

He said the court's decision is "the best memorial" for the lost seafarers.
